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INTRODUCTION

This project began, and was intended to be completed, in the winter of 1977. Originally, it was to be a grand album containing all the precious old photos and memorabilia gathered through the years by my parents, Ben and Rose Bodensteiner, complete with their descriptions. At a family gathering, the idea grew into one of having a copy made for each of their children, and grandchildren. Then, why not include the wonderful stories told to me by Dad and Mom, my brothers and sisters, and some of the older relatives? Surely, such a book should also list our ancestors as far back as we know them, and our cousins . . .

In contacting cousins for their family group lists, I discovered a surprising amount of interest in family history. Few cousins could name all their great-grandparents or all their great-uncles and great-aunts. Dad and Mom agreed with me: a family history must be published. They encouraged me tremendously, and helped wherever they could.

Most genealogists deal with only one ancestral line at a time. But I had not planned to be a genealogist. I simply started by asking a few questions about all eight of my great-grandparents! Soon, my search was jumping from Bodensteiner and Balk to Kuennen and Meyer; from Rausch and Spielman to Werner and Schoeberl!

Early in the search, I was most fortunate getting very good leads on my Bodensteiner ancestors. A postcard saved from 1914 led to the discovery of Bodensteiner's in North Dakota. Great-grandfather's own writings were found, pinpointing the little village where he was born. Research in Bavaria was now possible . . .

What a thrill it was for Dad to share in all my interesting mail! Several years earlier, he had received a book "Before the Colors Fade", and loved all the stories of years gone by. On April 20, 1978, he suffered a stroke and for Dad, at the age of 87, the colors did begin to fade . . . Just a week before he died on July 26, I could finally tell him how we were related to the Bodensteiner's in North Dakota, and he was overjoyed! About my family history, he told me once again: "It's important that you do this! It's important that you do it right!"

Now it is winter of 1979, and I have gathered so many pictures and so much information on all my ancestors, that I have to divide it into three books. This Bodensteiner volume will be followed in 1980 by "The Rausch Family". In the last several months, so much good information has turned up on Mom's family that she and I could hardly keep up with all the developments. The third book will be "Ben and Rose", the album I had originally set out to do two winters

There is really no time that one can say a family history is complete. Once begun, so many contacts are made, more ancestral data will almost certainly continue to turn up through the years. For now, I am satisfied that I have followed every possible lead in my search for Bodensteiner history. In time to come, if some important information comes along, or if a dream-trip to my ancestors' Homeland should materialize, a sequel might be in order.

In this book are listed John Carl's descendants down to his great-grand-children (my second-cousins), and their spouses; and all of the descendants of my grandfather Henry Bodensteiner. It is my sincere hope that someone in each of Henry's brother's and sisters' families will continue where I left off, and write their ancestor's story for their families.

Errors there will be, in spite of much proof-reading. I hope they will be neither too numerous, nor too serious. I will appreciate your calling them to my attention promptly, so they can be corrected before another printing. Comments and additional information will also be most welcome.

A big question during my search was: Which variation of great-grandfather's first name should I use? It seemed that even he was not sure which he preferred. On his baptismal record in Bavaria, he was Johann Karl. On his marriage record, which was written in Latin, he was Carolus. His first land deed in Fayette County was signed J. Charles. The second one, five months later, was John Karl; then Charles, Karl, John Carl and J. Carl. Subsequent deeds were almost all signed John Carl. The latter version was the one he used most often in his writings - so John Carl must have been his first choice.

The family group lists were gathered in 1977 and 1978; therefore, some of the data is nearly two years old. Surely, since then some families have moved, and/or changed occupations; perhaps there have been some births or deaths that I am not aware of. I apologize for not being able to update right to the printing date.

Shortly before going to press, I decided to include in this book my grand-mother Helena Bodensteiner's family - The J. Barney Kuennen Family. Most of the family's data had already been gathered; most of the photographs were already processed. Father Denis Kuennen had already researched the Kuennen ancestors, and happily agreed to guest-write several pages about them. It seemed fitting to put the two families - all my Dad's ancestors - into one book, especially since a good share of the readers are descendants of both families. My only regret is that I have as yet not been able to learn much about Helena's maternal ancestors - the Meyer's. There are so few leads at this time . . .


ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

BODENSTEINER ANCESTORS IN BAVARIA

Great-grandfather John Carl loved to read. And he also loved to write - in all the blank spaces of his favorite books. One wonders if he ever dreamed as he wrote one hundred years ago, that one day his family would carefully translate his every word, for possible clues about his life and his origins.


We knew that he was "Geboren in Bayern" from his tombstone and the memorial card at the time of his death. But no one knew where in Bavaria he was born. Until his granddaughter, Margaret Pint of Osage, looked through some of his old books and discovered all his writings. (Her parents, John and Theresia Bodensteiner, had lived with John Carl and farmed the home place for fourteen years.) Here it was, in great detail, written across the top of the first page of "Das Goldene Familienbuch":



"John Carl Bodensteiner from Bernerieth by Dollnitz and Leuchtenberg, district of Regensburg, Oberpfalz region of Bavaria, land-district Vohenstrauss."

In September 1977, with the above information, my brother-in-law Ben Schaufenbuel had no difficulty finding the area. His son-in-law, Marvin Mueller, was driving the car while Mary Jane was writing in her diary:

(From Switzerland) . . . "All through the Austrian and Bavarian Alps . . . Through Mittenwald, Berchtesgaden, Prien, on to Wasserburg where the streets were very narrow and old . . . Stayed in an old, old hotel there . . . Crossed the beautiful Danube in Regensburg . . . Continued north to Vohenstrauss, very near to the Czechoslovakian border. Went first to the Rathaus (Town Hall) to find records. They suggested we go to Leuchtenberg, but first made a copy of a map for us which showed all the small towns in the area. The lady made a phone call, then told us of a possible relative in Wieselrieth . . .




LEUCHTENBERG - "The Pearl of the Oberpfalz."

. . . So we drove to Leuchtenberg which was approximately 10 km. away. The countryside in this area is very pretty. It is softly rolling hills and stretches of woods and patches of farmland. The highways are quite good, either pavement or blacktop, but not as wide as ours in America. Leuchtenberg is an old, old town at the top of a great hill. An old castle ruins is at the very top, and just below that is the church. . . We visited the priest in the rectory just across the street. He told us that all the "Taufshein", or birth records, would be in Regensburg, which is the head of the diocese. Dad got the address . . ."

Ben surprised me one day in January 1978, with very detailed records from this Bishop's Central Archives: "Tauf-Urkunde" (baptismal records) from the church at Leuchtenberg for "Bodensteiner Johann Karl" and "Balk Margarethe", (our great-grandmother). And the "Trauungs-Urkunde" (marriage records) of both their parents, giving not only their dates and places of birth, but also naming their parents! Plus, an invitation to more research: "Thre Familienforschung kann noch weitergefuhrt werden." (Further research on your family is possible!)

Four requests and a year later - they insisted on using surface mail - we have two rather complete Ancestor Charts, going back to great-great-great-great-great-grandparents, and the late 1600's!

Maria Theresia came to America. For her story, see page 133.

About Theresia - we know nothing. Perhaps she died in infancy, or outlived John Carl, being he didn't write about her death.

Their mother, great-great-grandmother Margarethe, died on March 26, 1846, at the age of 37, leaving Michael with seven children, ranging in age from 7 months to 17 years. On February 13, 1849, he married Walburga Roebl, daughter of Andreas Roebl, a tailor from Waldau, and Apollonia Gensmann. She died fourteen months later, on April 7, 1850, at the age of 44. Michael married Barbara Reil on February 23, 1852. She was the daughter of Paul Reil and Margarethe Braun, farmers near Zeissau. On March 12, 1857, she died at the age of 53.

Great-great-grandfather Michael died on September 2, 1859 at the age of 57.



John Carl and Margaretha Bodensteiner

"4 July 1859 - Came to America." These few words are all that great-grand-father wrote about what must have been one of the most important events in his life. They were found on the inside back cover of his Goldene Familienbuch. On another page, he recorded the death of his beloved Margaret: "Mutter Tod 2 Feb 1879, 42 Yahr Alt, in Land 20 Yahr."

From this, we know they both came to America in 1859. But so far, we have been unable to find the passenger list for their ship(s). Until we do, we will not know if they came together, or whether John Carl's brother and sister, Joseph and Theresia, came with him. Nor do we know when Margaret's four brothers and sisters came. Her older sister, Barbara, was in America as early as 1850, according to the biographies her two daughters wrote upon entering the convent.

Why did they come to America? How I wish they would have written in detail about this. It seems very few immigrants talked a great deal about the reasons. Surely, in many instances, their families were reluctant to let them go. Once in America, they were very busy making a new home in a new land. Letting their thoughts dwell too much on their Homeland would cause them to long for dear ones left behind . . .

A study of history of that era, tells of religious oppression, and much turmoil in Germany and all of Europe. All around Germany, countries were trying to expand their borders. There was great unrest among the people, resulting in the

French Revolution in the late eighteenth century, and revolutionary movements in Germany itself, especially in 1830 and 1848.

Many young men came to America to avoid the military service. Evidently, this was not the case for John Carl: "In 1853 I entered the Military in Regensburg, and again in 1854. I was on active duty only three months. Out of the six years it was lucky . . ." If his younger brother, Joseph, came with him in 1859, he would have been eighteen years old, just about the age . . .

Most likely, we will never know for what reasons our ancestors left their homes for a new life in America. Perhaps they simply loved adventure!

John Carl and Margaret must have been fiancees already in Bavaria, because just three weeks after the date that he wrote he (possibly they) "came to America July 4, 1859", they were married in St. Lucas, by the priest from Festina.

MARRIAGE RECORD OF OUR GREAT-GRANDPARENTS from Festina church records. *

"Today 26 July 1859 entered into matrimony at St. Lucas Carl Bodensteiner 27 and Margaretha Balk 21 years. Witnesses: Michael Wurzer and his wife."

Although he neglected to sign his name, the celebrant must have been Father Feddermann, pastor at Festina, who performed the other marriages recorded on this page. The few priests in Iowa at that time had to serve a large area, as the next marriage by Father was at Stacyville in Mitchell County.

John Carl and Margaret farmed 1/4 mile west of St. Lucas, on the present Al Dietzenbach place. (Bernadine is a great-granddaughter.) Great-grandfather evidently enjoyed the buying and selling of land. (See deed records page 25.)

Their first child, Johan, was born on April 22, 1860. Baptismal sponsors were neighbors Johannes and Magdalena Wurzer.

Their second child, Theresia Margaretha, was born on July 28, 1861. This time the sponsors were John Carl's sister, Theresia, and her husband, H. Henry Kuennen. They had married two months earlier, and were farming just down the road. When their first child was born in May, 1862, Margaret was sponsor with Henry's father, Gerhard Kuennen.

Tragedy struck both families several months later. Both Bodensteiner children died of the black flu, or diphtheria. Tradition has it that John Carl was burying little year-old Theresia, when he was told that his two-year-old Johan had also died. Just two weeks later, little four-month-old Maria Kuennen also died, perhaps of the same sickness.

Another daughter was born to John Carl and Margaret in December of that year, and was also given the name Theresia. Henry and Theresia Kuennen were again chosen as sponsors.

John Carl and Margaret were sponsors for the second Kuennen baby, John Carl, who was born on September 3, 1863. He died in infancy, and just five months later, his mother Theresia Bodensteiner Kuennen died at the age of 21.

What hardships and sorrows these two young couples had to endure! In eighteen months, to lose four little babes, and a young mother!

In the ensuing years, eight more children were born to John Carl and Margaret. The last child, Casper, evidently was still-born, as great-grandfather wrote "was born 6 January 1879 Tod" (dead).

And in his own words: "Mutter Tod February 2, 1879. 42 years old, 20 years in this land."

Great-grandmother Margaret didn't have time to write anything for posterity, but she left nine healthy children who grew up and had large families of their own.

Mother died February 2, 1879, 42 years old, 20 years in this land.

John Carl married a second time on October 2, 1883. His bride was a widow, Kunigunda Baumler. The witnesses were his brother, Joseph, and his wife Maria. Some grandchildren thought they remembered hearing that Kunigunda had two sons, one of them a priest. After much research, it seems that the only Baumler priest in Iowa was Father John B. Baeumler. I was able to find much information about him, even a photo, but it was some time before I learned the identity of his mother. In "The Carroll Times" of November 30, 1932, his obituary states that his parents were "John and Margaret Baeumler . . ."

Could Margaret and Kunigunda have been the same person? That question was answered by two nieces who were mentioned as having been at his funeral. One was a nun then - "Sister M. Leocadia of St. Anthony's home, Sioux City". The other niece entered the convent shortly thereafter. Both have written to me, and from them I learned that Margaret did remarry - but she never came to America.

I am now quite sure that Kunigunda did not have a son who was a priest. But it is a coincidence that Father Baeumler worked for "an uncle" in the St. Lucas

area when he first came to America in 1882, at the age of 14. (Late info: His mother was born Margaret Hirmer.)


On the marriage license record and the land deeds at the Court House, and on their marriage record at our church, her maiden name is not given. She is simply listed as Kunigunda Baumler. Some day I hope to learn more about Kunigunda. She died on February 22, 1899.

Great-grandfather's third wife was Catherine Freyburger, a widow from Buffalo, New York.


From early conversations, I gathered that she might have been a "mail-order bride". But perhaps this was not entirely true. John Carl had some connections in Buffalo from early on. One of his early books was given to him by someone from there, and a nephew, John Baptist Bodensteiner, worked in Buffalo for eight years before returning to Bavaria. But, perhaps great-grandpa did put an ad in a paper . . .

She did come on the train to Fort Atkinson, and several weeks later, on November 3, 1900, they were married. She was dearly loved, I learned from all of John Carl's grandchildren. She taught them to count to one-hundred in French, and had she stayed longer, no doubt

they would have learned to speak French fluently. But John Carl died in 1911, and Margaret Pint told me that she and her sister cried several days when "grandmother went back to her family in Buffalo" in 1913. She died there on June 29, 1926.

John Carl's writings clearly show that his church, and his faith, were very important to him.

In the first years, he and Margaret worshipped in the little log church where the public school later stood.


This beautiful church was built in 1870, and the parish was given a resident pastor. Imagine the bittersweet memories this edifice held for great-grandfather:
The youngest children were baptized here; quite surely all his children were married here. His baby son,
Casper, and a few weeks later, his Margaret, were buried from here; as were his daughters - the young mothers - Barbara and Mary. And finally, in 1911, great-grandfather himself.

John Carl loved music. His grandchildren remember hearing that he played the organ in church, and sang on the choir. It seems rather interesting to me that so many of his descendants also love to sing and play musical instruments. I have often heard people remark that "all the Bodensteiner's are good singers". . .


For years, great-grandfather sold "Mirra"s-beautiful wooden music boxes. The "records" were round metal plates with tiny discs for each note of the song. His grandson, Luke Bodensteiner remembers:

"... about the Mirra: We had a small one that made tingling high-note music, and a much larger one that made much richer music. I played them by the hour. I never got tired of them. Later the phonograph came out, but the Mirra has my fondest recollection..."

The accompanying picture was sent to me by the Cyril Bodensteiner family of Fort Dodge. Everyone that hears their Mirra is "enchanted" by its lovely sound.
